About the Show

Just So is a highly entertaining musical comedy based on the "Just So Stories" by Rudyard Kipling. Set in Africa, Just So follows the travels and exploits of an elephant child (who wants to know the answer to every question you could ever imagine) and a bird that can't fly as they attempt to challenge an enormous over-grown crab who has taken control of the ocean and, indirectly, holds the lives and livelihoods of all the creatures on the earth in his claws.

Just So Stories

The musical show is based on the "Just So Stories for Little Children" by British author Rudyard Kipling. First published in 1902 the stories are "pourquoi" tales, fantastic accounts of how various phenomena came about. The stories are written in a comically elevated style inspired by the formal speech of India, full of long and improbable-sounding words and place names, many of them fictional.

Kipling first created the "Just So Stories" for his eldest daughter, Josephine, to entertain her on their long sea voyages from Southampton, England to South Africa. The stories often involved some of the animals familiar to them from their time in South Africa and India (e.g. elephants, giraffe, zebra). Sadly, Josephine died during an outbreak of influenza in 1899, but her father's stories live on. The term a "just-so story" is now used in academic anthropology, biology and social science describing an unverifiable and unfalsifiable narrative explanation for a culture, practice or a biological trait or behaviour of humans or other animals!

History

Work on the musical began in January 1985 by the lyricist and composer team of Anthony Drewe and George Stiles. On the basis of just two songs and the synopsis for the show, Just So won the 1985 Vivian Ellis Prize for young musical writers in April of that year. The panel selecting the show for this brand new award included: Alan Jay Lerner (My Fair Lady), Andrew Lloyd Webber, Tim Rice, Don Black and a young producer named Cameron Mackintosh.

As a direct result of the award, the first main production was performed at the Barbican Theatre in Plymouth over Christmas 1985, produced by Cameron Mackintosh. Despite its success, the show required several rewrites before Mackintosh again co-produced the reworked version at the Watermill Theatre in May 1989 (directed by Julia McKenzie). After further rewrites, suggested by none other than Steven Spielberg (who secured the rights to turn it into a feature animation), the show opened at the Tricycle Theatre in North West London in December 1990 (with a cast including Linzi Hately, who went on to star as the Narrator in the 1990 West End revival of Joseph and leading roles in other West End productions including: Les Miserables, Chicago and Mary Poppins). The show also travelled overseas with productions in the US at the Goodspeed Opera House and North Shore Music Theatre.

The most recent professional production was the critically acclaimed version performed at the Chichester Festival Theatre over the 2004 summer season, starring an array of musical theatre leading lights, between them performing roles in the West End productions of Joseph, Sunset Boulevard, Honk!, Anything

Goes, My Fair Lady, Mary Poppins, The Sound of Music, Avenue Q and the new West End musical version of Sister Act. The production included the choreographic and performing talents of Stephen Mears as the Kangaroo (who went on to be co-choreographer for the West End and Broadway productions of Mary Poppins, alongside Matthew Bourne), Richard Dempsey (perhaps better known as Peter in the original BBC television series of The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe) as the Elephant's Child and Julie

Atherton as the Kolokolo Bird (who had previously appeared in the West End as Sophie in Mamma Mia! and went on to create the leading role of Kate Monster in Avenue Q).


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George William Stiles was born on 9 August 1961 (the day before the UK applied to join the EEC and four days before construction work began on the Berlin Wall). He met his greatest collaborator, Anthony Drewe, whilst studying music at Exeter University.

In addition to his work with Anthony Drewe, George Stiles has won awards for Moll Flanders, Tom Jones and The Three Muskateers (produced with Sam Mendes whilst working as the musical director at the Donmar Warehouse, other scores at this time included: Habeas Corpus, Twelfth Night and Uncle Vanya).

Anthony Drewe

Anthony Drewe, who was training to become a biology teacher at university when he met Stiles, wrote the new lyrics for The Card (nominated for Best Revival in the 1995 Laurence Olivier Awards) and A Twist of Fate (winner of Best Musical of the Year Award in Singapore).

Anthony is also a keen on stage performer, including roles in A Twist of Fate (Inspector East), The Three Muskateers (Porthos), Rogues to Riches and the original cast recording of Just So (Cooking Stove). He has also directed the following shows: Snoopy, Cowardy Custard, Just So and Honk!

Together*

Stiles and Drewe wrote Honk! together in 1993 as a commissioned piece for the Watermill Theatre. It went on to win three Best Musical awards - the 2000 Laurence Olivier Award for Best New Musical, the FNB VITA Award in South Africa, and the Elliot Norton Award in the US. Honk! has been produced over 3,000 times, including Barnstormers' own production in 2005!

In addition to Just So and Honk!, they have collaborated on many other musical theatre shows including: Mary Poppins (West End production nominated for Best Musical in 2004, with a Broadway transfer in 2006 and the opening of the UK national tour in 2008), Peter Pan (Best Song and Orchestrations - 1996 Denmark International Musical of the Year Awards and performed in concert with the BBC at the Royal Festival Hall with the late John Thaw as Captain Hook), Tutankhamun (their first ever musical, first performed in Exeter) and Soho Cinders (an original remake of the Cinderella story centred on an internet love story and set in modern day London) for which Gareth Gates recently made his West End debut performing songs from the show at a recent revue entitled "A Spoonful of Stiles and Drewe" at Her Majesty's Theatre. A cast album of the concert is available for all fans!

Ann has appeared as Duchess Proudfoot (Cinderella), Fruma-Sarah/Villager (Fiddler on the Roof), Joyce Grenfell (Barnstorming), Chastity (Anything Goes) and the Genie of the Lamp (Aladdin) and loves being on stage.



Paul is a very intellectual kind of auy and enjoys testing his IQ whilst watching QI. When he is not frying his brain cells he loves sport, particularly rugby, football, cricket and Formula 1. His favourite family holiday was a trip to Switzerland when his Dad videoed a hovercraft through a zoom lens. Unfortunately his Dad hadn't realised just how close the hovercraft was. Paul still enjoys recalling the look on his Dad's face when he looked up to see it coming straight for him. He is thrilled to be playing such an unusual role in this production. His previous credits include: Cinderella (Snatch-it/Little Jack Horner). Fiddler on the Roof (Rabbi), Anything Goes (Sailor), and many more.



This is Laura's final year at college before she takes time out for a Gap Year prior to heading off to University to read Early Childhood Studies. Laura loves sport and the outdoors and has enjoyed camping in her back garden with her sister for many of Barnstormers' previous "show weeks". Laura's favourite performances include: Little Miss Muffet (Cinderella), Chava/Russian Soldier (Fiddler), Wickersham Brother (Seussical), Swan (Honk!) and Poppy/Munchkin (The Wiz). She has spent many hours in the park studying her beloved dog, Tammy, to develop her role of the canine persuasion in this year's show. Woof!



Sheila is convinced there is a global plot to cast her as floozies and outspoken cheeky lasses following her previous performances as Belladonna. an ugly sister (Cinderella). Erma (Anything Goes). Mayzie (Seussical) and Lowbutt (Honk!). Her grand consolations have been playing the roles of Golde in last year's production of Fiddler on the Roof and Auntie Em (The Wiz), the latter being a role she took on with only one day's notice. Sheila also enjoys co-running one of the Church Voyager (Sunday school) groups and coordinates fundraising activities for Barnstormers.



Following Cinderella, John was convinced that he had finally reached Barnstormers' retirement age. Fortunately for the audience, he was reminded that no such age limit exists, so he has reluctantly agreed to return to the stage in the shared role of the Eldest Magician. His favourite shows include: Godspell, Honk! (Greylag), Anything Goes (Rev Henry T Dobson), Aladdin (Narrator), Joseph (Brother) and Seussical (Mr Mayor). John is a pastoral visitor, coordinator of the Church newsletter and generally involved in almost all aspects of the Church!



Caroline returns as Director following two previous directing roles for Barnstormers with Aladdin in 2006 and last year's production of Fiddler on the Roof. She has relished the challenge of creating characters with both human and animal characteristics for this witty comedy musical. She is also no stranger to the stage with performances as Rubella (Cinderella); Evangeline Harcourt (Anything Goes); Pinkfoot (Honk!) and roles in The Wiz, Seussical and Godspell. When not directing Caroline enjoys relaxing with her feet up and a glass or two of wine.

The part of a rhino is not really a fair reflection on Bert's character. He is really more a very organised bull in a china shop. After many years of hard graft, Bert finally retired from his role of producer for Barnstormers after Fiddler on the Roof, but has somehow managed to complete a number of producer tasks again for Just So. He is convinced that he has enough to worry about with learning his lines, songs, dance routines, moves, etc! He has also appeared as Baron Hardup (Cinderella), Lazar Wolf (Fiddler on the Roof), Elisha Whitney (Anything Goes), Drake (Honk!), General Ghengus Kahn Schmitz (Seussical) & Potiphar (Joseph).



Mandy loves performing with Barnstormers and has played many roles, including: Countess Comelately (Cinderella), Yente (Fiddler on the Roof), Hope (Anything Goes), Mrs Mayor (Seussical), Ida (Honk!) and Mrs Potiphar (Joseph). Her favourité film is Out of Africa so she was particularly excited to discover that some of the action in Just So also takes place in África. She was only slightly disappointed to learn that she would not actually be able to wander across the plains of Africa in preparation for the show but would instead appear on stage in a dusty attic wearing a cobweb-covered Magician's cloak. However she is still looking forward to waving her magic wand!



Dick has developed the skills of a superior craftsman having worked hard behind the scenes in creating many of the sets for Barnstormers' shows following his debut for Godspell with a spectacular park fence, including a touch of boat building for Seussical, Anything Goes and again this year for Just So. Dick is also a dab hand at drawing. He has also performed across the south coast in various bands, including the 6 piece band Late Shift and played for many shows with local theatre groups over recent years, including: Anything Goes, Seussical, Honk!, The Wiz and Godspell.



Mark is very proud to have appeared recently as Gregor, a Dung Beetle, in Metamorphosis. His favourite on-stage appearances include: creating the role of Trevor in the World Premiere of Storage the Musical (Brighton Pavilion Theatre), Valmont (Dangerous Liaisons), Leonardo (Blood Wedding), Moonface Martin (Anything Goes), Dandy Dan (Bugsy Malone), Abanazar (Aladdin) & Eustace Clotworthy (Jack & the Beanstalk). He has also provided lighting for many shows including: The Devils, The Love of the Nightingale, The Pilgrimage, Seussical, Honk!, and Joseph. Mark is able to recite the script (and sound effects) for The Titfield Thunderbolt, his favourite childhood film.



Alex was extremely disappointed to narrowly miss winning the Barnstormers' Band Musical Adversity Award last year for Fiddler on the Roof. He is hopeful that this year, with last year's winner out of the line-up (Ed: was this foul play?), he should be first in line for this greatly revered trophy. Alex loves playing the drums, almost as much as he loves his job as an IT guru. He admits he loves his TV more. He has provided the drums & percussion for many musical theatre shows, including: Cinderella, Fiddler on the Roof, Seussical, Blitz, My Fair Lady and his favourite to date, Anything Goes. He will not be attempting to put off his brother in his debut on stage performance in Just So... much.



Paul has a history of breaking guitar strings at inappropriate moments, including once in 1957 (Ed: surely he is too young?) and again in 1965. Thankfully it has all been plain sailing since then but he asks that you keep your fingers crossed for him today. Over the years he has appeared in countless amateur line-ups on bass, rhythm and lead quitar (not all at once!), most recently in Shazam! recreating the music of The Shadows, his first musical influence. Paul also builds and repairs guitars, running a kind of six-string rescue service. He is thrilled to be playing alongside one son and will be attempting to watch the other in his stage debut out the corner of his eye.

Despite many years of strong resistance, often spent hiding behind the sound desk or running around backstage with radio microphones. Seb has finally been pushed kicking and screaming into the limelight and has taken on a number of roles in Just So, including playing a bottle of Brandy and leering as a leopard. He loves roller blading (although he has some way to go in learning to stop) and playing his electric guitar, not necessarily at the same time. He can also be found assisting Shazam (a Shadows tribute band) and playing regularly at Dorset Gardens Methodist Church's Café Connexion.



Just So is Nick's musical theatre debut and he can't wait to perform as the crabby, claw snapping, ground flooding crab, Pau Amma. He was delighted to discover that he would also be playing a Wildebeest, although admits that giving it an appropriate "voice" has been somewhat of a challenge. Nick hopes that his time spent in the changing geographical landscapes and continents in Just So will help his university studies in Geography and International Development. He is also an avid supporter of Liverpool FC and Brighton & Hove Albion.



Rachel loves baking cakes and has taken on the valuable role of Cast Caterer, keeping the cast's energy levels up by providing biscuits and cakes galore every week. She maintains that she will not be held responsible for the number of calories consumed during the course of rehearsals. Rachel previously appeared as Spider/Boy (Cinderella), Barman/Boy (Fiddler on the Roof), a Who (Seussical), a Duckling (Honk!) and a poppy/Munchkin (The Wiz). When not on stage Rachel loves reading books as diverse as Twilight and Pride and Prejudice.



Margaret loves handicrafts and is a dab hand at flower arranging. gardening, cooking and anything involving fabrics. She has made time in her busy schedule to cut cloth as wardrobe mistress/assistant for a number of productions including: Cinderella, Anything Goes, Jane Eyre and the Mystery of Edwin Drood. Her favourite on stage performances include: Cinderella (Queen), Fiddler on the Roof (Shandel), Anything Goes, Jane Eyre, The Mystery of Edwin Drood, A Little Night Music & Calamity Jane.



After Hyder's stage debut as Mordcha the Innkeeper (Fiddler on the Roof) he suggested that his son join him on stage to develop a new family tradition. His son was obviously less willing to tread the boards but Hyder has gone from strength to strength with the royal promotion to King for Cinderella & Friends. He is looking forward to playing a variety of roles in Just So, including the conniving Crocodile. Hyder is also a regular flute player in the Church orchestra and in local concerts.



Matt only recently stepped onto Barnstormers stage for the first time but quickly proved his potential as Little Elf (Cinderella), Fyedka (Fiddler on the Roof) and as the side-kick and assistant to the Great Magician, Jim Sampson, for Barnstorming. He has developed many new skills as the Kangaroo including creating magnificent long jump records and performing with a stunning Australian accent that rivals the cast of Neighbours. He hopes to soon win over Kylie Minoque. In the meantime he is due to complete his BTECs in Sport and Football Development and the Community Sports Leadership Award this summer.

Hannah loves working as joint Head of the PE Department at Longhill High School where she teaches everything from dance to rugby and thoroughly enjoys the challenge of watching her pupils running circles around her. She even admitted to washing and ironing the spare PE kits in her own time. Hannah also works alongside her co-performers, the drummer and the Leopard! Hannah appeared as Widow Sharpeye (Cinderella) and Nachum/Sasha in Fiddler on the Roof, and has also appeared in various roles in Anything Goes, Seussical, Honk!, The Wiz, Godspell, Joseph & most of Barnstormers previous productions.



After managing to twist her knee so badly during the run of Cinderella & Friends that she couldn't even attempt the two minute walk home. Jill is sincerely hoping that she can maintain an accident-free backstage this year. She has been the stalwart of the props cupboard for many years and Stage Manager for the most recent Barnstormers productions: Cinderella & Friends and Fiddler on the Roof. She will be tenderly looking after the backstage crew. telling off the cast (usually for trying to eat the backstage sweets) and keeping backstage house again for Just So.



This is Hannah's debut performance in the Just So band and she is thoroughly looking forward to the challenge of looking after "the boys". Her favourite musical theatre experience was playing for Sweet Charity in Bedford where she not only coped with the challenging musical score but also had to keep elbowing the conductor to remind her of the cues! Hannah is really a classical pianist at heart and loves performing with chamber groups. She confirms that the audience should only be slightly scared that as a doctor-in-training she prefers to listen to The Killers in her spare time whilst curling up at home in her surgical scrubs!



Jean has performed in many weird and wonderful roles in her time with Barnstormers, but appearing as a cake ingredient is very high on her list! She has willingly taken on the role of running the Barnstormers box office for many years and has found time to perform in almost all of Barnstormers productions, most recently: Cinderella (Farmer's Wife/Compte Roue's Wife), Fiddler on the Roof (Avram & understudy for Fruma-Sarah) & Anything Goes (Virtue). Jean admits she is a meat and two veg kind of girl at heart.



Gary is a white van driver and self-confessed Earl Grey tea drinker, but we try not to hold that against him. If you were to stop beside him at the traffic lights you would be treated to the sounds of Gary performing as Frank Sinatra, Elvis Presley or one of the girls from Abba. He is trying to invest in a suitable wig. He thoroughly enjoyed playing Tevye in last year's production of Fiddler on the Roof and has also appeared as Compte Roue (Cinderella), Captain of the S.S. American (Anything Goes), Widow Twanky (Aladdin), Vlad Vladikoff/Yertle the Turtle (Seussical) and various roles in Barnstorming.



This is not the first time that James has played an elephant on stage. As Horton the Elephant in Seussical, James gained a good grounding for his role as the Elephant's Child (even though Horton was slower and fatter than the inquisitive young elephant that he will be appearing as today). James really does love performing on stage despite his persistent denials that he would prefer to be playing football or chilling out in a local drinking establishment. Other previous roles include: Big Elf (Cinderella), Motel (Fiddler on the Roof), Billy (Anything Goes), Jesus (Godspell) & Joseph (Joseph).



Despite her own better judgment, Louisa has developed some rather domesticated tendencies. When she is not cooking, dancing or singing in her kitchen (sometimes all three at once), Louisa works as a Tax Manager for a global travel group. She has been quoted as saying: "No, really, tax is exciting". Louisa recently created the role of Brenda in the World Premiere production of Storage the Musical (Brighton Pavilion Theatre). Her other most recent roles include: Prince Charming (Cinderella), Hodel (Fiddler on the Roof), Reno Sweeney (Anything Goes), the title roles of Jane Eyre and The Baker's Wife, The Cat in the Hat (Seussical), Queenie (Honk!) & Dorothy (The Wiz).







Russell is actually the King of DIY and has taken on many small projects at home over the past few months. He denies this is anything to do with his wife nagging him. When he is not fixing cupboards or plugging in more electronic equipment, Russell can be found helping with the set, sound, lighting and music set up for Barnstormers' productions. His recent shows as musical director/keyboard player include: Sleeping Beauty, Cinderella, Snow White, Fiddler on the Roof, Anything Goes, Aladdin, My Fair Lady, Seussical, Honk!, The Wiz, Winter Warmer, Godspell and Joseph. He also once appeared as Ratty in Wind in the Willows. His wife refused to comment.



Sarah is looking forward to her debut performance in the adult cast of Barnstormers for Just So. 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
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
